Interview with Chrissie Keating

Thomastown Guild, Kilkenny Federation, active ICA member for the last 70 years.

I was invited to join the ICA by Mrs Flood, a garden designer of note, who designed the Rose Garden in Mount Juliet and who liked the ethos set out by Anita Lett. It was 1951 and I was just 17 years old.

At that time I was working at the Kilmurry Estate as a poultry mistress. The estate was owned by Mrs Hoblan, horse trainer to the Queen, for horses to be ridden side-saddle. She was another forward thinking woman, as all her livestock and chickens were organic. When I married my husband in 1955, I had to give up work as was usual then.

I have held various roles in our Guild including being Guild President 3 times! I've entered so many competitions, I can't count them all. I have 7 Bronnari awards which include; Cooking, Sewing, Knitting, Patchwork, Rush work, Skin curing and Lumra Rugging. Forty years ago, I was told that I was the only person keeping the Lumra Rugging craft alive in the South East! I also was awarded Demonstrators bars and a Teaching Diploma. With my teaching diploma I was accepted a teaching post as one of the first teachers in the now world renowned, Grennan Art and Craft School in Thomastown.

In the beginning, Thomastown Guild had between 40 and 50 members. Over the years we have participated in so many community activities from setting up the annual Blood Bank to initiating the local Horticultural Show where produce and craftwork was sold every year. Our numbers have fallen and now we have only 10 members. The average aged has also changed over the years, but the one thing that has never changed, is our Guild meetings are always full of laughter and craic!

The role of ICA has changed a lot too. For some of our members, the Guild meeting was the only time they got out of the house apart from Mass on a Sunday. They didn't even get out to do the shopping, at that time a van used to go around with groceries. Now women "jump in the car and go anywhere". We didn't have cars at the time. The good old trusty bike was our only transport. I was one of the lucky ones to have a car, but you still had to be economical with the petrol! It was good if you had a neighbour to chat to but around Thomastown a lot of women lived outside the town and were quite isolated. So the friendship that the ICA brought to us was so important.


In the ICA you learned to be part of something different. It brought friends to your life and helped you when you might be down. You could learn skills to help in everyday life. ICA gave us a voice. Public speaking in our Guild helped shy, timid women to be able to voice opinions that they may have never been able to before. We had to know how to sew, mend and make clothes. We were the queens of upcycling then. We learned how to budget and get the best out of what we had. How to eek out food to cover a few days. No fast food then! When the Craft Classes return to Central Office, I will be there with my daughter Brigid to continue learning, socialising, having fun and enjoying all that ICA has to offer. Kitty Harlin RIP

Kitty Harlin was the ICA National President from 1988 to 1991. Kitty was a founder member of Scurlogstown Guild, Meath Federation and involved in the first Scurlogstown Olympiad festivals. She went on to become Meath Federation President from 1979 to 1981. She was appointed to the board of ACOT (The National Advisory and Training Body) and represented ICA on the Consumer Committee in Brussels. In 1998, she was chairperson of the Meath People in Need RTE Telethon committee.



During her time as National President she was elected president of COFACE - the Confederation of Family Organisations in the European Community, the first person from outside the major European countries to hold the role, overseeing 90 organisations across member states. She was also a founder member, vice-president and spokesperson for the International Year of the Family. She was awarded a special UN Testimonial for her "exemplary support to the United Nations Programme during the International Year of the Family 1994." Upon hearing of the sad passing of Kitty Harlin COFACE issued the following statement; "Kitty is part of COFACE and Europe's DNA. Her legacy is of great importance and felt today more than ever as we advocate the rights of families and for gender equality". Kitty Harlin died surrounded by her family, in her 96th year, on 22nd January 2022. May she Rest In Peace.

GUIDELINES FOR GUILD AND FEDERATION MEETINGS

On Friday 21st January 2022, following public health advice, the government agreed that most of the public health measures currently in place can be removed. This means we welcome the return to Guild and Federation meetings with no restrictions on social distancing, capacity or the need to show Covid



<u>certificates.</u> However attendance at meetings is still a personal choice, if individuals still have concerns about themselves or their family members, they should continue to assess their individual situation. As stated on the gov.ie website, the efforts of the Irish people over recent weeks to reduce social contacts, and take care when they did meet others, combined with the high uptake of the vaccination and booster programme, has made a considerable difference to the public health situation.

A number of public health measures will remain in place until 28 February 2022:

- requirements for mask wearing in all settings where currently regulated for
- Continuing to follow the current advice for those with symptoms, cases and close contacts as announced by the government on 12 January 2022
- continued focus on maximising the uptake of the primary and booster vaccination

KEY MESSAGES:

- 1. If you have any symptoms isolate and get a test. If you are a close contact follow the guidance on the HSE website www.hse.ie
- 2. The best way to keep yourself safe is to ensure you are fully vaccinated and have your booster.
- 3. Continue to wear masks in appropriate settings
